Gratitude for Summer's Bounty

Buon Ferragosto! Thanks to an abundance of sunny days, we are enjoying the fullness of summer here on the western side of the Cascade Mountains. Fruit is ripening and the mountain wild flowers are in bloom. Observing and taking delight in small and big changes in nature helps me feel attuned with the cycles of life, something my farming ancestors did as part of their daily lives. The plants remind me that change is always happening; the cycle of life continues. With the passing of my 90-year-old mother, just a few days after the Spring Equinox, I have been immersed in the past, an emotional landscape of ancestral territory. Going through Mom's things these last few months, I have found some treasures. Among them were two certificates from 1935 documenting that each of her parents – emigrants from Trentino and Alto Adige/South Tyrol – had passed an English language course at the Emily Griffith Opportunity School in Denver, Colorado. A gold sticker affixes a green and pink ribbon to the upper left corner of each one, highlighting its significance. These pieces of paper affirm my grandparents' accomplishment as they prepared for the test to become naturalized citizens of the United States, which they passed with pride, according to my Mom. Although my siblings and I have few things of my grandparents, these certificates are a precious testimony to the challenges they faced and met.

Loss of our beloved Elders serves as a reminder of how much their presence is a link is to the past, and how important it is for us to know their stories. By celebrating together, learning to cook traditional foods, exploring our family trees, and sharing our family's stories, we can honor those whose hard work made our lives possible, and carry forward the values of sharing and caring of our ancestors. Our yearly rituals can help us move forward.

Two recent events, our local Polenta Picnic and the international gathering of Trentini/Tirolesi in Ogden in July, have broadened my feeling of kinship and cultural identity, rooted in specific valleys and villages. Here's to our ever-widening family ties!

ITTONA Convention, Ogden, Utah Every two years there is a gathering of Trentino clubs in North America by the International Tyrolean Trentino Organization of North America (ITTONA). The 3-day event was held in beautiful Ogden, Utah on July 18-20, 2014. Seattle Trentino Club members included Joan Barker, Mary Beth Moser and Mary Inama-Ferguson a new member of our club.

Arriving participants were met at the Salt Lake City airport by youth volunteers to guide them every step of the way. The organization by the Ogden Trentini club over the next few days was

outstanding. No detail of comfort, care and delight was too small to escape their attention. The weekend was filled with scheduled events, including a trip the Family History Center in Salt Lake City for those who wanted to do genealogical research. ITTONA conventions provide a great opportunity to connect with a larger community as well as to experience the local culture of the hosting club. Ogden also hosted the conference in 1994, a tribute

The President of Trentino Nel Mondo, **Alberto Tafner**, attended the convention along with the Director, **Anna Lanfranchi**. Here is reprint of Tafner's speech, which discusses at the origins of the organization, the last 60 years in Trentino, and the emigrants' contributions to the lives of the people back home:

"Trentini nel Mondo started in 1957 to assist Trentini emigrants in need of a helping hand.

It is difficult to imagine life conditions of about 60 years ago in Trentino.

Let me take you, therefore, back at that time.

In the fifties, Trentino had gone through almost forty years of hardship with the First World War, the fascist dictatorship and the Second World War: cities and towns being destroyed, agriculture not sustainable, industry without jobs and tourism not at all what it is today.

Basically, Trentino was not able to sustain its people and therefore many decided to leave as their ancestors had done toward the end of eighteen hundred.

It has been said that in between the First and Second World War more than forty thousand Trentini in the United States of America were working in mining and factories throughout Pennsylvania, Colorado, Wyoming and Massachusetts.

The willingness and courage to find work abroad gave an important push to the birth of the modern Trentino by the money sent back home and the local resources more readily available but also for the knowledge and awareness introduced as "news".

Still, both in Italy and in Trentino the main concern was to rebuild what wars had destroyed rather than looking at emigrants who felt abandoned with their problems.

To fill this gap, some volunteers got involved in establishing the Association Trentini nel Mondo, which became the link to satisfy solutions for the emigrants, particularly on bureaucratic files, pensions, estates, health, etc.

In those years, life was not easy for the emigrants nor for those still in Trentino.

Over and above the rebuilding of the tragic wars' consequences, Trentino faced two serious moments in its history:

- the first being its annexation to the Italian Kingdom from the Austro-Hungarian Empire of which it had been part until 1919;
- the second happened at the end of the Second World War when the Region Trentino-Alto Adige was given special autonomy.

With this step, it was of paramount importance that Italian-speaking Trentini and German-speaking Altoatesini be living peacefully together which was not an easy task.

Nowadays, people try to forget that period of time but we know that for eleven years, from 1956 to 1967, terrorism was rampant: the first dynamite attack took place on October sixth in Bolzano.

Later on, there were three hundred and sixty of them, which damaged electrical trellis, bridges, railway tracks and water mains causing serious losses to the economy that instead required to be rebuilt.

Sadly, between civilians and armed forces there were twenty-one victims until the diplomatic and political efforts reached a new Autonomy Statute in nineteen seventy-two, which assigned previous Regional responsibilities to the Province of Trento and the Province of Bolzano.

It is useful to briefly point out what our special autonomy is.

Basically, it recognizes the ability of Trentino and Alto Adige to govern themselves which had been done throughout history since the year one thousand thus proving how to use best their territorial, economic, social and political resources.

Since the constitutional law issued in 1948, Trentino can legislate and administer some primary sectors as public health, roads construction, culture, international solidarity, emigration, environment and education, all of which throughout Italy are state controlled.

These last sixty years Trentino has greatly developed to the point of becoming one of the most advanced areas in both Italy and abroad and held up as an example.

Following these fast changes, Trentini nel Mondo had to adjust its own main role of welfare assistance to a more suitable role while maintaining the volunteer and solidarity aspects for which Trentini nel Mondo is recognized.

Today, Trentini nel Mondo comprises the Head Office of the Association in Trento and the over two hundred Clubs throughout the world working all together in mutual and reciprocal collaboration.

Luckily, today we are in better times than used to, and this helps in building a strong exchange network of knowledge and opportunities useful to all Trentini people wherever they may be.

Let's imagine Trentini nel Mondo as a great network fed by each one's contribution to create a large community with people having the same roots and common values like solidarity, intellectual honesty, work ethics, reliable human relationships, people respect and dignity: values that from the beginning have been the foundation of that special added value called "trentinità".

This is Trentini nel Mondo's mission in the firm belief that a more and more selfish and impersonal globalization may bring about the fading of past memories, the neglect of traditions with identity loss and ultimately the oblivion of our history. A future like this has to be avoided.

For this reason, in the next few years Trentini nel Mondo will engage systematically the organization and network of Trentini Clubs and individual Trentini who want to recognize themselves as such with the goal of creating a large, solid and strong Trentino community as the core contact between people considering themselves as "one".

Let's carry this message back home as I am like you, you are like me, we are all the same ... like a pea in a pod."

ITTONA serves as an umbrella organization uniting all Tyrolean-Trentini clubs in the US and Canada and acts as a liaison with the Trentino nel Mondo Association and the Autonomous Provincial government of Trento organizations in Italy. Both ITTONA and Trentino Nel Mondo have a website and a Facebook page so you can stay connected.

### **Publications of Interest**



La festa della Signora Polenta, by Stefania De Carli, is a great way to introduce kids - and all readers - to important words in our Trentino culture, centering on food! Over thirty young artists did the illustrations. The story cites numerous places in Trentino, traditional dishes, and local agricultural products, the fruits of the earth, in a most delightful way. The representatives from Trentino Nel Mondo gifted one copy of this children's book to each club, which we will soon have available in electronic form for all members, in Italian as well as in English. This book is a great educational contribution to our club and to our families.

**Lourdes Franch**, Chicago club president is developing an idea for a scripted enactment of the text as a way to get kids involved, which she is sharing with the other clubs.



**Nelle viscere di queste miniere: lettere e storie di emigranti**, (In the bowels of these mines: letters and histories of the emigrants) is a beautiful approach to conveying family history – through publication of the emigrants' letters sent back to relatives in Trentino. The emigrants departed from Cloz at the beginning of the 1900s to go to Montana, Idaho, and Wyoming. After an introduction of the place and times of the emigration, including maps and photos, the book focuses on the Angeli brothers and the Franch brothers.

The author, **Maria Floretta**, who traveled from Val di Non, Italy to attend the ITTONA convention, is the Mayor of Cloz. *La Sindaca* had met a number of the Ogden folks during their visit /family reunion a few years earlier to Cloz. Maria brought and gifted a few copies of her book, which readers of Italian, especially those with family ties in Val di Non, may be interested in reviewing. It provides a precious first-hand cultural history of the emigrant's lives.
